

Gardening



AUTUMN COLOURS



The colour fairies have been really busy this year, just look at all those lovely leaves on the trees and hedgerows. It is a little-known fact that every single leaf has its own number embossed on the underside, only visible to the colour fairies. Each number corresponds to a different colour - the fairies gather around the giant golden acorn cup and select random

acorns that, when broken open reveal a coloured number; it is then the job of the fairies to complete the 'colour by numbers' picture before all the leaves fall and trigger their hibernation period.

Some would say this is an ancient myth that has been passed down through the generations, and as my grandad would say 'the story has grown a beard'. However, I think there could be something in it - I mean we know there are tooth fairies, flower fairies and washing and ironing fairies so why not (in my house anyway?) By comparison the story 'THEY' want us to believe (whoever 'they' are) is, in my opinion, much more of a stretch to the imagination - let me tell you what I have found out through my extensive research. (okay so it was ten minutes on google - other search engines are available!)Cont'd/

Gardening (Cont'd)



Apparently leaves contain pigments that help them to obtain food through a chemical process (that old chestnut). There are three main pigments, chlorophyll (green) carotenes (yellow) - I suppose they want us to believe that's what makes carrots orange - and anthocyanins (easy for you to say) = reds and pinks. As the nights get colder, the chlorophyll is destroyed giving the leaves a yellow tinge. If the temperature stays above freezing this encourages production of anthocyanins turning the leaves red. In dry weather and bright sunny days more anthothingy is produced making the leaves even redder. Variations in the weather conditions creates a mix of different pigments to give varying shades of colour. I don't know about you, but I know which explanation is more believable to me. I started to look at why leaves fall but it gave me a headache. I mean, who thinks up this stuff?

A nice place to visit on a sunny Autumn day to see some lovely colours is Marks Hall Arboretum on the Coggeshall Road just outside Earls Colne. It's beautiful at any time of year but such a picture now (they have more than their fair share of fairies). There are many other places to visit, I suggested to the good lady wife a stroll around the castle at Hedingham. She didn't fancy it - never mind it's just a fort.



Gardening (Cont'd)



Okay, back in the garden now, let's talk propagation specifically hardwood cuttings. Once the shrubs are dormant with little or no leaves left, we can start looking for suitable cutting material. Look for straight twigs, they should be this season's growth, nice rigid stems. Make the cut just above a bud/leaf node. Depending on the length of the chosen stem you may get three or four cuttings from one piece. Make a straight cut with secateurs below the lowest bud and 4"-6" (100 –150mm) higher up the stem make a sloping cut just above a bud. The sloping cut helps identify the top of the cutting. If you have a patch of bare soil somewhere out of the way that won't be disturbed for a year, but not where the rain can penetrate, make a slit in the ground with a spade and push the cuttings in so that two thirds of each one is below the soil surface. Keep the area weed free and make sure it does not dry out, and 12 months later you should have small plants ready to pot up or transplant into place. Any deciduous shrub or fruit bush will make a good candidate for hardwood cuttings, such as blackcurrants (*Ribes nigrum*), mock orange (*Philadelphus Hydrangea*), roses (*Rosa*) and so many others. If you're not sure if it's the right type of plant, do it anyway – what's the worst that can happen?

I know I keep harping on about mulching, but it really works for me. Apart from hiding bare soil, it keeps moisture in, and during the winter protects dormant plants underground from extremes of cold. It's home to all sorts of critters and bacteria valuable to the garden. It eventually breaks down improving soil structure, it supresses weeds, and anyCont'd /

that do grow are easily pulled up, roots and all, because of the moisture and loose structure of the soil underneath. Mulching at this time of year is much easier with less plant growth showing and the soil is moist and still has some warmth in it, a bit like shutting the door before all the heat escapes from the room. There are many types of mulch available, ornamental bark, (breaks down slowly and is generally larger pieces), straw mulch (slow to break down), or a more permanent cover is shingle and decorative stone.

My favourite mulch is woodchip, a by-product from tree surgery, a mix of small chippings from various trees and shrubs including conifer. It breaks down nicely and is cheaper than ornamental bark. You can find tree surgeons offering loose tipped transit loads locally for £75-£100. I also like a soil improver mulch, or eco compost (the material produced from the waste that is collected from our green bins). It is almost like putting a layer of compost over the ground but it hasn't got the ingredients added that make general purpose or specific composts. It is very lightweight and easy to spread, it looks attractive, and it allows moisture in so can be used all year round without the fear of preventing summer rain from reaching the plants' roots. Garden centres offer this product bagged up and some offer loose tipped delivery, again it's around £75-£100 pound per tipper load. Mulching is as good as weeding. 'Laters taters', keep calm and carry on weeding, **Gary**



A Decade Of Starlight

It all started when I met a wise man in a garage.

He was about four feet tall, made of chicken wire and papier mâché, and seemed to have misplaced his two wise friends! He was in the garage that was part of the Old Vicarage in Shut Lane which over the years had been used to store all sorts of things from the church.

But the wise man didn't become part of the story, he was just the inspiration for other things that developed, things that happened without a project or a plan but came together more smoothly than if one had existed, guided by God and our love for the church and village of Earls Colne.

Earlier that summer I had cleared the brambles, ivy and elder from the roof of the partly subterranean boiler-house on the north side of the church. Standing on the newly revealed roof, just a couple of feet above ground level, I thought what a wonderful roadside pulpit it would make, close to where vehicles would be slowing down for the sharp bend round the churchyard.

So later, when I met the wise man in the garage it wasn't a big leap of faith to think about building a nativity scene on the boiler-house roof for the coming Christmas. So, I asked around to find out how difficult it would be to create a similar MaryCont'd /





and Joseph, a baby Jesus, shepherds and two friends for the wise man.

"Much too complicated!", "Too time consuming!", "They would be ruined by the weather and never be ready for next Christmas let alone this year!" was the disappointing feedback I received.

But "Forget about the wise man, we could do it with silhouettes," was the reply I didn't yet understand...

Liz is a talented and creative artist and quickly drew me some sketches to show what she meant - they looked fantastic but were a fraction of the size we needed! We decided on the best height for the finished articles, so they could be clearly seen from the road and I got some suitable plywood sheets for each character. Then the real magic took place as Liz took the sketches and enlarged them onto the plywood. A shepherd with a crook, a shepherd boy with a lamb, Joseph, Mary holding baby Jesus with an ox and ass for the background as well.

Now they had to be cut out, and John, who was an experienced cabinet maker, had all the skills and tools that were necessary. In a few more days they were perfectly



finished and ready for the messy job of painting with a couple of coats of matt black paint.

Now we needed somewhere for them to come together, preferably a stable and it was about time I did something to help! So, using more plywood sheets, some rustic looking wood for the framework, and some poles from the garden centre, I built an open fronted stable across the boiler-house roof. The outside was treated with a deep brown fence paint, but the inside back panels and the inside of the roof were painted bright white to reflect the light from the two hidden LED lamps, which would back-light and frame the silhouettes.

John supplied wooden-block clamps to hold each silhouette in place and the base was covered over in straw to finish it off. It wasn't until the following year that the wise

men finally arrived by the porch, with the trail lights guiding them, and visitors, round to the stable.

The Christmas star was the guiding light that led the shepherds and wise men to the stable and our nativity scene would certainly gain from having that special star above it. If you want to learn more about our unique star, check out my blog post from 2015 using the QR code.Cont'd/

Nathan is a problem solving, entrepreneurial engineer, the best I know. I can't now remember when or where it was that we met and ended up discussing the technical problems of building an illuminated Christmas star, but as always it was a great discussion with lots of ideas and the exploration of wide-ranging possibilities. Could it be made big enough to be seen from the top of the tower, what colours would be possible, could we have a cross in the centre and much more. Nathan had a lot of detail to bring together but thought it was possible, and he would relish the challenge.

What I do remember is the day I saw him carrying it into the churchyard. It was huge, yet light enough for one person to carry. Nathan had thought of everything - clamps for mounting, tension

wires for stability, cables, connectors and control boxes, even ropes and harnesses for hoisting it up the outside of the tower, with everything weatherproofed to the highest levels, as it would be exposed to the worst of the winter weather.

With just a little maintenance and updating we have been putting the star on the tower now for nine years. It has become a pleasant Christmas routine and I'll be there with Nathan for this our tenth year, but circumstances mean this time I will only be supervising from ground level.

Of course, other people helped too, and many more have been involved over the years. The original stable was replaced a few years ago by our wonderful Churchyard Team,





Cutting the Anthills Meadow has been topping the to-do list this autumn and it is very hard manual work as only brush cutters can be used, otherwise the anthills will be destroyed if machinery was used. Once cut, the vegetation must be raked up - another laborious job. Jayne and I are so grateful to the "fabulous few" who have worked so hard already on this.

Whilst we were clearing the area, a small nest of dried grasses was found and after consulting local ornithologist James, we were told it belonged to a skylark. It's so encouraging that this species, which is in decline has chosen to nest here. Because skylarks are ground nesting birds, next year we will request that dogs are kept on a lead in the Anthills Meadow to protect these birds in case they choose to nest here again.

As in 2023, James again carried out a bird nesting survey for us but with the cold, wet Spring, many birds started nesting much later and due to the resulting lush vegetation, it was harder to find the nests, although making it an ideal situation for the birds. In all, James was able to find the nests of 18 different species.


Work on the wildflower project in conjunction with Four Colnes Horticultural Society has almost been completed in the lower Ryefields Meadow. The wildflower haybales from the Woodland Trust site at Fordham have been spread over the area and will hopefully have dropped their seed by now, and all that remains to be done is to remove the spent hay. This is due to happen on November 9th. Again we would like to thank Oliver Wass for the great amount of help he has given us. Hopefully there will be something toCont'd /


Open All Hours

The area of the High Street between the White Lion Inn and the blacksmith's forge on the corner of Queens Road had been the market place of Earls Colne since the middle ages. Although a regular market was no longer held, Philip Buck - recalling his childhood in the 1850s - had vivid memories of the annual fair traditionally held on Lady Day at the end of March:

"Near the blacksmith's shop was a grand show within which might be seen the fattest lady on earth or the most noted conjurer ever known. From that point ran a row of booths open towards the doors of the houses. Gingerbread, nuts and other delicacies crowded some of the stalls; toys, cutlery and fancy articles filled others. Late at night that side of the street was pandemonium. The last time I saw the Fair was in 1867. I believe it was abolished in 1869."

For the rest of the year the permanent shops served village customers late into the evening until, in 1902, the local paper announced that normal closing time would be 7pm instead of 8pm except for Early Closing at 2pm on Thursdays.

Recipe Corner



Mincemeat - This is the ordinary, bog-standard mincemeat people use, better than what you buy in the shops, though, because it's not so syrupy sweet. I found the recipe in my grandmother's 1920s cookery book, which is annotated with her notes, although sadly there are no notes concerning the mincemeat. However, I have altered it a little myself.

Method: Making mincemeat is really an assembly job. Grate the apples, using a cheese grater or food processor. Juice the oranges and lemons. Grate some of the peel of the oranges and lemons (about 1 tablespoonful).

Toss everything into a large mixing bowl. Cover the bowl and wait a couple of days. Keep stirring. The dried fruit should start to absorb the liquid and

Ingredients

1lb shredded vegetable suet (ok, beef suet if you must)

1lb apples (weighed after peeling and coring)

1 1/2 lbs of dried fruit

12 ozs brown sugar

4 oranges (big oranges, not little satsumas)

2 lemons

1 tsp powdered mace

½ tsp of ground allspice

1 wineglassful of brandy

swell. If the mincemeat looks a little dry, add a little water. Put mincemeat into jam jars to store. **Rosemary Johnson** (Note from Editor: or make some delicious mince pies!)

On Armistice Day "the Silence" was kept in the Church and followed by a celebration of Holy Communion.

We must also record our thanks to Lieut. Col. Lowis for his very efficient organisation of the Sale of Poppies on Saturday, the 8th, when the splendid sum of £25 12s 9d (£25 62p) was realised for Lord Haigh's Fund. The ladies, who ably assisted him, are to be congratulated on the result of their patriotic work.

Graham King T: 07923 445128 of most people, and not merely at the Cenotaph at Whitehall or the grave of the Unknown Warrior in the Abbey. Church and State will see to that. But what of the people of Great Britain? That depends on each parish or group of people doing their bit in the way of Remembrance. We can, as a village, be thankful that something was done. That Armistice Day was near was learned, if that were necessary, by a visit paid to every house in the parish by four ladies, Mrs. Gilbert, the Misses Perkins, Proctor and Smith, inviting all to purchase poppies for Earl Haig's Exservicemen's Fund. Of ex-servicemen, 700,000 are unemployed; 250,000 are disabled; 5,000 are in Mental Asylums, while 2,500 officers are not, as yet on the King's Roll, just because they are exofficers. And this six years since the Armistice itself!

My Dear Friends

By the time that you receive this letter you will, I hope, ALL have had a very happy Christmas and when the New Year comes, I hope it will be equally as happy.

I am glad to have this opportunity of thanking one and all alike for the kind way that they have received me as Vicar of this parish. I came here rather more than six months ago, a complete stranger to you all, but the welcome that I have met with from each one, has made me feel at home among you. It must necessarily take some time, in a large parish like ours, to get to know everyone but I hope by degrees to do so. I am glad to say that everything connected with the Church is in a satisfactory condition, the congregations are quite good, and the collections remain about the same as usual. I have not any wish to make changes to the Church services, except that instead of the occasional Choral Celebrations of Holy Communion at 8 a.m. for the future on the Greater Festivals and on the third Sunday in the month there will be a Choral Celebration at the 11 o'clock service. There are several things I should like to get done

as regards the decoration of the Church, which I think would be an improvement; the first thing being the painting of the roof of the Chancel, which would make it much lighter; a suggested design has been put up which will give some idea as to what is proposed to be done. The Sunday School keeps up its numbers, but there is great need for additional teachers and a superintendent of the boy's School. I must thank the churchwardens and sidesmen, the organist and the choir, the bellringers, Sunday School teachers and others, for their invaluable help in the conduct of their services and the work of the Church generally.



An excellent, well attended, evening was held at the Atlas Club, Foundry Lane in October. Alex Stevenson, owner of Jordans Farm, Wakes Colne, gave a talk on her farm re-wilding project, a project that is now seeing the result of several years of effort bearing fruit through a noticeable increase in diversification of insects and plant life. Rewilding is, in part, letting nature loose but also controlling some parts in order to keep a good balance between vigour and allowing the less strong insects and plants to thrive as well.

After the talk, the Brick Meadows Trustees gave an update on the work being carried out in Ryefields to promote a wildflower meadow. This has involved considerably more work and expense than in a "normal" year, so we hope it bears fruit. As we absorb the splendour of the Earls Colne Primary School Fireworks, our heads are a week ahead forward planning for the removal of all the hay spread on Ryefield. To be successful this operation will involve many willing people, some good weather and some energy. Time will tell.

Up On The Allotment



Onions (allium cepa), time to get planting those onion sets, set them out in rows 12" (30cm) apart and 4" (10cm) between bulbs, plant them with the tip poking out of the soil and get some sort of protection over them otherwise those pesky birds will keep pulling them out of the ground, horticultural fleece works as well as anything, it's only for a week or two while the roots get a hold, don't forget to water them in when planting. Onion sets can be planted anytime from September to November, also in March and April, but according to spud the rule used to be "set on the shortest day and harvest on the longest, it has always worked like that for me" he says.

He plants shallots (allium ascalonicum) as well, they can go in from November right through to March, plant them the same as you would onion sets spacing them just a little further apart.

I am going to get some garlic in, the cloves are planted pointy side up about 1" (2.5cm) below the surface, 6" (15cm) apart with 12" (30cm) between rows, they don't like competition so keep them weed free, also if they need watering in dry spells do it at ground level because the wet leaves are prone to mildew. They should be ready to harvest in early summer, you know its time when the leaves go yellow, lift them carefully and lay them in the sun to dry for about four weeks, then they are ready for storing, did you know that when the leaves are green they can be used on salads or as a garnish, I haven't tried that yet, but I will next year.

It is a good time to plant rhubarb (rheum rharbabarum) crowns now, a sheltered spot with plenty of light is what they like, plant the rhizome with the crown above ground, water in and wait for spring, simples! Laters' Taters, **Gary**


