Brick Meadows, Earls Colne

In the autumn we had a fantastic and humbling response to our appeal for funds for the continuing upkeep of the Trust's fields and woodland. Thank you to those who generously donated. Some of the money raised has been put towards wood for benches.

Since installing our first bench in the Long Meadow in 2023, many have requested others to be put in strategic places within the meadows so they can sit and enjoy the peace and tranquillity of these natural surroundings so close to the village centre. An additional bench is now installed by the stream, Hawe Brook, on the path through the Poplars field. In summer with the trees in full leaf this is a very tranquil and "tucked-away" position. This field was once the home of the lower of three ponds in which fish stocks were kept to feed the Priory monks. Fish were caught from this pond and transferred to another pond within the Priory grounds. Hawe Brook, was once diverted to run alongside the hedge in a concrete culvert, remains of which can be seen under one of the wooden bridges. It was returned to its original course at the beginning of the century and now meanders pleasantly through this area.

In addition to these simple oak benches the Four Colnes Horticultural Society has installed a seat in the bottom meadow behind the Coggeshall Road houses in memory of Andrew Crane. Andrew was a stalwart of the society, entering many classes at the annual show with his fruit, flowers, and vegetables. He was a keen supporter of The British Legion and organised many coach trips for villagers.

Extending to over 7 hectares the meadows and woodland owned and managed by the Trust afford a variety of differing aspects of the countryside. With the world and **Cont'd..../**

life seemingly so fast and busy, the opportunity to sit within natural surroundings, if only for a few minutes, is calming for the soul.

Three supporters have kindly offered to sponsor the purchase of wood to make owl boxes for nesting tawny owls, several of which seem to inhabit the area. We hope to have them made and installed before nesting time. Owls calling are a common sound throughout the night and early dawn in this area.

Along with gathering a plethora of historical village information, our local historian and long -term village inhabitant, John Steadman, is extending his research to include the history of the meadows and fields owned by the Trust and this will be included in future articles. We also hope that John will be willing to host a walk through the Brick Meadows later on this year; watch out for updates here.

A small group of volunteers meet up on the third Thursday each month between 10 and 12 to help with general maintenance of the Meadows. If you would like to join us, please put your details through the door of 14 Park Lane, Earls Colne.



Gardening



February - **a full 29 days.** Hang on a minute, don't all months have 29 days? I have been looking through the plant catalogues that come through the post this time of year and I have been tempted by the plug plants. I am going to give them a try to see if they work out better than growing from seed. I must admit I may have got a bit carried away; when my good lady wife Mags saw the bank statement she said "if you don't stop buying plants I am going to leave you". That's a shame; I am really going to miss her. I stepped away from the catalogues and had a look to see what I could do outside

to occupy myself. I have some really nice willow (*Salix*) and dogwood (*cornus*) shrubs looking good in their winter colours. I have left them as long as I can but I do need to prune by the end of this month if I want a good show again next winter, they are in damp corner of my garden where they thrive in the moist soil; it doesn't get the sun all day but enough to keep them happy. I could leave them alone but if I do they will put on a lot of growth which will make them too big for where they are and only the new growth will colour up next winter; therefore I prune them down to about 6" (15cm) from

the ground; cutting just above a pair of buds; this will keep them to a good size and encourage more stems.

If snowdrops (galanthus) are your thing, now is a good time to plant them 'in the green'; this means buying them from nurseries that lift them as the flowers fade and sell them in bunches for planting directly where you want them to grow. Planting like this rather than setting bulbs means they will establish quicker and multiply more readily; they like moist but well drained soil which is why they thrive in a woodland setting, flowering before the canopy of the trees blocks out the light, and they are less likely to rot from waterlogging during the summer months when they are dormant. The most common species is galanthus nivalis but there are so many other varieties, all lovely in their own right, looking especially good when planted with cyclamen coum.

I took the opportunity of a nice sunny day to prune my roses (rosa). First job as always is to sharpen secateurs, second job is to take out the 3 'd's, dead, diseased and

dying; then if the roses are well established I like to take out some of the older stems completely to encourage new growth from low down, never more than a third of the plant though. Then starting at the base of a stem I follow upwards looking for outward facing buds, ideally the second one up, then prune off just above this one; by doing this on all stems it should create a nice shape with an open centre allowing good air flow through the bush and reducing the risk of disease. The principle is the same with climbing roses apart from tying in long stems and pruning sideshoots back by two thirds, again to an outward facing bud; the direction the bud points is the direction that shoot will grow.

'Laters taters'

Keep calm and carry on weeding. Gary

Peregrination round the world to come home

I have written before about my peregrinations, or wanderings; they are usually by foot but in November I had the great good fortune to be able to fly round the world to New Zealand. We went via the United States and returned via Japan!

It was rather a hectic trip, but we enjoyed a few days of relaxation in Fiji before flying on to Wellington. We were picked up from the airport as the sun was rising and we were feeling groggy after a night flight, but our driver insisted on pointing out the highlights of the journey, most significant of which as far as he was concerned was a magnificent Hindu temple, with a tall, tiered, decorated tower in front of which stood a gold pillar. Our driver also pointed out Muslim mosques and Christian churches in the small villages and communities we passed.

Everyone says that New Zealand is like Britain in the 1950s, and I can see what they mean. We spent a week in the small town where our son Toby is a vineyard manager. It is the ideal town

with a green square in the middle which has a hotel, a supermarket and numerous bars around it. Independent shops line the streets that stretch away from the square. And there were a few small churches – including one dedicated to St Andrew like ours in the Colnes. In every town we drove through we saw churches and centres of Christian worship of various denominations, often clearly used as community or charity centres.



We only had two days to spend in Japan. We stayed in Tokyo but my Japanese friend, Naoë, took us on an hour's train drive to Kamakura where we walked the processional way and up a long stone flight of steps to a splendid, ancient Shinto shrine. It was founded in 1063 and expanded in the twelfth century. Many visitors come at the New Year to pray for good luck, and children are taken there throughout the year — when they reach one, three and five (if a boy) or seven (if a girl) years of age. We saw some delightful young children dressed in traditional costume and bribed with sweets to behave and smile for the **Cont'd..../**

photos their proud parents were taking. Naoë showed us the correct procedure for praying – a ritual of bowing and clapping. Kamikura is also home to many Buddhist temples, a few of which we visited, appreciating their calm beauty surrounded by trees beginning to change colour in the autumn sunshine.

It seemed that wherever we went round the world there were places of religion in the centre of communities; although we came back via Dubai where, though a devout Muslim country, any trace of spirituality seemed to have been crowded out by conspicuous wealth and spending.

It was a relief in a number of ways to return home and our own beds – and 'our' village, Colne Engaine. And there, in the very centre of the village, is the church. About contemporary with the Shinto shrine in Kamakura, the building dates, probably, to the eleventh or twelfth century and it became the parish church with the appointment of the first Rector in 1219. Eight hundred years later, it is still used for prayer and worship and remains open every day. It belongs to the whole parish and I know many people who never attend a service but will go in and sit down for a while, enjoying the peace and quiet. It is a place to be still and reflect; some may call this praying. In a recent article, David Goodacre

wrote of the importance of parish churches as a resource for the whole community: 'the church is its oasis of peace and quiet in the midst of a noisy world, especially for anyone who is unhappy and needs the peace.'

Of course, it is also a place for celebration, and where people can come together and find a community of new and old friends.

Everyone is welcome in this building – those who believe and those who don't, the young and the old, the married and the single.

2023 Poppy Appeal Result



Earls Colne and White Colne collected £8,218.90. Gift Aid should add about another £440. This is over £600 more than last year (with Gift Aid still to be added) and becomes the second highest total ever raised (2018 being the highest total at £9,387.28)

Concentrating our efforts in the Co-op really paid off this year. The total collected in the Co-op by volunteers or in the tins by the checkouts plus contactless donations was £6,155.52. That is 75% of the total raised by the entire Poppy Appeal. Our strategic location and the space to display goods on a small table undoubtedly helped to boost the total. Contactless takings were also up by £1,000. My thanks go to the Co-op for letting us collect in their shop.

We ran our regular coffee morning fund raiser on Saturday 11th November. There seemed to be more in attendance this year and this was reflected in an increase of more than 10% in takings. The raffle did exceptionally well with plenty of prizes all donated by individuals or local shops. The cake sale proved popular with every cake, jar of jam and chutney sold. At 11am we observed the National two-minute silence and the exhortation was led by our longest serving volunteer, Winsome Grimwood, who has now achieved an astonishing 65 years as a Poppy Appeal volunteer.

In the Spot Light – Juliet Townsend. During a bleak year – 2020 - a pandemic was raging across the world, and we had a Remembrance Day which would not be celebrated with parades and services.... However, a trail of poppies appeared at the Five Bells Pub in Colne Engaine. We were then treated in December to a countdown to Christmas with images of advent doors; each morning a door was 'opened' and a new image would gaze out of the windows on the residents taking part in their daily fresh air walk...

The snowdrop fairy then started popping around to people's houses, leaving her tag on windows, spreading her hope of a new spring. A clever marketing ploy: if you wanted some snowdrops in your window, you needed to visit the Five Bells social media and register your interest, and the fairy would come and visit.

As her skills developed, and the Five Bells was allowed to provide takeout food, we saw the birth of themed windows featuring whatever fare the publicans – collectively known as Darraline - were providing that week.

And that was the start of a career Juliet Townsend didn't see coming but is loving none the less.

During the 11 weeks of window murals at the Five Bells, and keeping their social media alive, local people were asking her to do some bits for their homes and businesses – sunflowers and window murals - and then Halstead Physio asked for a feature window a month and Juliet started to expand locally.



windows, she selects her art materials. Initially she started off with chalk board pens on glass – all that was available in the pub during lock down. As she developed, she started trying different paints and pens (she has lovely glass patio doors to practice on at home!) One of the things important to Juliet is the sustainability of her craft, so the search started to find refillable ones.

I asked Juliet why she does her installations on glass —they are transitionary, and temporary, take so long to research, sketch out, bring to a working template and then progress to being drawn onto the glass, all just to be removed a month later.

'Each installation is not about me; these pieces are temporary promotional marketing for a business. I hide easter eggs about the company in each of my drawings — something the company might not always know about themselves! It is about story telling in a whimsical way as their business on face value might be unexciting. Everyone within a business tends to enjoy what they do, so you need to get that out to the public. Take their passion and personality and put it onto their window. Just because a business might be about cars, doesn't meant that they don't like musicals.'

Since the very early snowdrop days, Juliet has now been commissioned for pieces in

Liverpool to commemorate Eurovision, Penguin books at the Red Lion Book shop in Colchester, featuring the Thursday Murder Club (approved by Richard Osman himself), a semi-permanent design in Chelmsford, as part of the Concrete Canvas Chelmsford Street Art Festival, which guaranteed her art work to stay for a year. For this, Juliet decorated a utilities box with a generic map of meeting places within Chelmsford .

So, on asking Juliet what her favourite/most fun/hardest installations were, she found it impossible to answer:

'I always love the last one I have done, I absolutely love what I do, they are always challenging, I am always over ambitious, and I always surprise myself with what I can do. I always think hard and do imagery searching, researching, and designing - I love the whole process.'

I tried a different tact: was there an installation that had affected her on an emotional level?

'I did a barber shop in Hedingham to commemorate Remembrance Day. The barber is ex-RAF and during the internal part of the painting, I realised how important the barber shop is for the male community, especially with pubs and socialising on the decline. The bonding, chatting, setting the world to rights, needs a space to be, and barber shops fill that gap'

We looked back through her work on Instagram, where her work has been appreciated and enjoyed by many. We managed to narrow the installations down a little bit!



The Narnia Window on the Ministry of Hair and Beauty was her overall favourite; it was the turning point where she realised that this is her thing and, yes, she can paint animals.

Bringing her local environment into her artwork fills her with joy. When commissioned to create a window for Owens Aves Opticians featuring flowers wearing glasses, Juliet was inspired whilst walking her dogs in the local fields.

Where is Juliet headed next?

Christmas was so busy with installations, all over Essex,

that this year she is looking for ways to develop: diversifying and finding new avenues to get her art out there. She concludes

'Like all things in my life, an opportunity will materialise, and I will just go with it and see where it takes me.'

Up On The Allotment



I have been getting plenty of mulch on the allotment. The plot thickens...

Hairy Potter has inherited a large clump of rhubarb (rheum rhabarbarin) on his plot,

which needs dividing up and replanting. Now is a good time to do this and I helped in return for a few crowns to top up my patch. It needed digging down quite deep. It has been there a few years, but we got it all out. We were quite rough with it but it's tough. We pulled out some nice fresh healthy looking crowns and replanted them in their new position. My patch is well mulched so they should be happy there, whereas Hairy's plot needed lots of compost digging in first to give the crowns a

better chance. He planted them about 18" (45cm) apart to allow room for them to spread, with the crowns just poking through the surface.

I put some upturned buckets on my existing rhubarb to force some early shoots; should have some pickings in March.

By the end of Feb, I hope to have laid out my seed potatoes (solanum tuberosum) in egg trays for 'chitting' (encouraging shoots to grow from the eyes of Cont'd/

the potatoes). They need to be laid out so they are not touching each other, with the eyes pointing upwards. An unheated greenhouse or shed will do as long as they are protected from frost. If really prolonged cold temperatures are forecast, I lay a bit of fleece or newspaper over them at night.

If the ground isn't waterlogged or frozen, the end of February is the start of the outdoor sowing season: this includes parsnips (*pastinaca savita*), broad beans (*vicia faba*) and onion (*allium cepa*), seeds, not sets.

If you are into growing indoors then there are a few more options, namely, aubergine (solanum melongena), cucumbers (cucumis sativus) peppers (capsicum) and greenhouse tomatoes (solanum lycopersicum), for growing on in a cold greenhouse.

By the way, ladies, it can be very cold this time of year, so do let your men back indoors occasionally.

Just a final thought, if olive oil comes from olives, where does baby oil come from?







Recipe Corner



Cabbage with Zing

This time of year, cabbage is *seasonal*. If you order a weekly vegetable box, as I do, you will receive lots of them and there they sit in the fridge, so lonely, while you think to yourself "I will use that cabbage... tomorrow perhaps?" But as we all know cabbage is not very interesting served by itself, boiled or steamed, and tastes disgusting when overcooked.

So, what do you do with it? In summer, you can make coleslaw, but now it's winter. Minestrone? Curry? Stir-fry (although pak choi works better here)? And maybe you do want to use it as a side vegetable but can't face a heap of dull white shredded leaves on your plate. Try this. East Asian in concept, it has a pleasant spicy zing.

Ingredients

Half a small cabbage (about 12ozs) (shredded, with a knife or in the food processor)

- 1 medium-sized carrot (grated)
- 1 inch root ginger (grated)
- 2 big cloves of garlic (crushed)
- 1 tablespoonful rice vinegar
- 1 tablespoonful light soy sauce
- 2 tablespoonsful sesame seeds
- 2 tablespoonsful oil for cooking (Rapeseed oil is best.)
- 2 tablespoonsful fresh parsley (chopped) (optional)

Method

- Dry roast the sesame seeds in a pan, until light brown. Remove from pan. (Don't leave them on the heat to turn dark brown, as they will continue to cook after you have removed them from the pan and will burn.)
- Heat oil in pan.
- Add grated ginger and crushed garlic and fry for about a minute.
- Add grated carrot and shredded cabbage to pan and stir repeatedly until they are cooked through (for about ten-fifteen minutes). If the vegetables start to catch and burn, add tablespoonfuls of water.
- Just before serving, add rice vinegar and light soy sauce and stir in.
- Serve hot and sprinkle with roasted sesame seeds, and parsley (if using).

From the Archive

Memories of Greenhills Nursery

Several years ago, the Children's Society published a Christmas card which made me smile every time I looked at it. Designed by an adult to look like a child's painting, it shows the shepherds and the wise men lining up with Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus as if for the christening photograph. In the background, above their heads, the angels appear to be bouncing on trampolines. The card bears the title "The Hoolie Family". I've kept a copy of the card, partly because it cheers me up and partly to remind me that, for several years, Earls Colne had a direct connection with the Children's Society.

In 1960 the Society acquired the house called Greenhills just past the Recreation Ground and adapted it as a residential Nursery for young children awaiting adoption. Local people were pleased to support the Nursery in any way possible and the annual fund-raising Garden Party brought coachloads of visitors from other parts of the Diocese.

The Society began life as "Waifs and Strays" in 1881, later adopting the title "Church of England Children's Society". By the 1970s, like other social work organisations, the Society had moved away from residential care and now "reaches out to over 40,000 young

people each year, helping them to achieve a better future," according to its annual report.

The Greenhills Nursery closed in 1971 but one recent visitor to the village became very emotional when she was shown the building where her late father had spent the first few months of his life.




